WORKING TOGET



Highlight Wellbeing

This week - part 2 in the theme of de-escalating stressful situations and conflict within the family, I would like to look at strategies to **avoid** the escalation stage. Some ideas to try. . .

1. **Be aware** of your child's potential problem areas and common trigger points. For example, if you know that getting out of the door in the morning is always a difficult time when emotions are running high for all due to pressure of time, then get as much as possible ready the night before. Uniform ready, bags packed, lunches in fridge, lists of things to remember, list of jobs to do etc are all incredibly valuable tools, and can promote a more organised and calm environment.

2. **Give your child time to comply**. Often as a parent, it is easy to repeat a request many times, with increasing stress, while a child is still processing what they have been asked to do. Try getting eye contact, calmly asking them to do the job you would like them to do, and walk away. It can be surprising to see how effective this can be. Then lots of praise when the child has completed the job.

3. **Distraction and diversion**. If your child is starting to escalate into a heightened emotional state, it is always worth trying a distraction technique rather than engaging in any kind of argument. Keep positive and keep calm.

For example - 'Let's go and get a really cold glass of water, to refresh our minds'.

'I remember when last time you felt like this, it really helped when you had a bath/run around the garden/big hug/wrote down your feelings. . . '

4. **Tell your child what you would like to see, not what you don't** - For example - 'Please put your shoes in the big box' rather than 'Don't throw your shoes on the floor', 'Please talk more quietly' rather than 'stop shouting!'

5. **Take a really deep and slow breath**, and encourage your child to do the same. This will change your brain chemistry and help you to remain calm under pressure.
