Message from Miss Loosemore

Dear Parents and Carers,

In school we have been working towards being respectful of our learning environment with our House Captains leading a secret squirrel project.

Throughout the week they go across the school to review how respectful everyone has been in keeping the school tidy. So far his week our judges have been very impressed with year 5 and in particular 5M!

This week Mr Wright has taken two of our sports teams to compete in local competitions. Our first match was our Y6 boys football team who all played with determination and positivity on Monday away at Stanmore. The team performed well, a lot of them representing Hiltingbury for the very first time! The second was yesterday's badminton event at Thornden with our Y5/6 badminton team. It was lovely to see so many children register their interest in taking part in this event; six Y5/6 children were taken. After competing against several other schools, we were victorious winning the whole event. The team will now go on to represent Hiltingbury at the Hampshire regional finals competing against schools from across the county.

Please do also continue to share your children's achievements outside of school as we really love celebrating these in our assembly on a Friday afternoon.

We have received some feedback recently from parents in the community who have shared that the number of parents driving their children to school is having an impact on the intensity of exhaust fumes being created. In the afternoon we enjoyed exploring the work of Antony Gormleyand had the opportunity to do some sketching of our own inspired by pieces in the gallery.

In English we finished writing our information page on Iron Man to include the use of pronouns, prepositions and compound sentences. Next week we will be exploring Myths.

In Maths we are continuing to learn more about division using facts from the 4x tables.

Year 5 And just like that Year 5 have just completed their fourth week of learning of 2022. This week has been an exciting week with the launch of new topics in PDL and English. In English, the children have begun their new unit based on the Watertower, where they have been looking at how the author's choice of words and setting description creates an eerie, suspenseful mood. The children then worked collaboratively and created their own descriptive opening in the style of Gary Crew. In maths, we have been developing our area skills and have been investigating area in rectangles and compound shape with a variety of methods. Next week, we will be moving onto our next unit where we will be using a range of mental methods to multiply.

In PDL, the children have been learning about risks in everyday situations. They have been exploring why people take risks and what are the potential dangers and consequences of risks. The children were very engaging and valuable discussions were had. In games, the children have started their basketball unit and are learning how to move confidently with the ball by dribbling and stopping a basketball effectively. A lot of tense, team games were seen from the playground on Tuesday and Wednesday afternoon.

Year Group Highlights

Year 4 Another riveting week in year 4 has seen us exploring the world from many different perspectives. We have continued following the story of Michael and his family in English and have been weighing up the pros and cons of choosing to sail around the world for a year. Doesn't that sound idyllic after the last couple of years? The children debated points for and against and found that it takes a lot of skill to argue for the side that you don't necessarily agree with!

Our closely-linked science and geography units have seen us exploring South America with a focus on Perú, and we will be exploring the biomes of the South American nation. We described the position of Perú and its neighbours by using the eight-point compass directions. In science, we have all channelled our inner Attenborough by looking at classification of living things and considering what they need in order to survive in their different habitats.

The children have impressed us with their thoughtful ideas and empathy while reading Malala's Magic Pencil, trying to step into the shoes of the children in the story and wondering what we would draw if we had our own magic pencil.

With more of this to look forward to, plus working on our multiplication and division in maths, we're already excited to see what's going on next week.

Year 6 - This week in Year 6, we have had many enjoyable lessons including maths, english, guided reading, french and geography. During maths, we have been learning about 3D shapes both their names and properties. This has involved: counting vertices, apexes, faces and edges. Throughout the week, we have been studying how to use indirect and direct speech to help us with our newspaper report based on the Giant's necklace (by Michael Morpurgo). To add extra information, we have been practising relative clauses.

On Wednesday, we read 'a night at the circus' then answered a question sheet that had different sections: fact retrieval, word meaning, inference, prediction and language. Plus, we did some work on a book called 'Everest'; this book is based on the true story of Tenzing Norgay and Edmund Hillary, who were the first people to step foot on Everest's summit. Linking to that, one of our favourite subjects this week has been geography because we had a perplexing insight on the gigantic glaciers of the Himalayan mountains.

Bonjour, we have carried on telling the time in our fabulous french lessons this included learning minutes past and minutes to. While doing our spelling lessons we have been matching 'ibly' and 'ably' words to their root words. At the start of the week, we started shooting and perfected our landings in netball. Overall

"Don't assume that you can't take this on because you work and have other commitments. Myself and Louise both have full time jobs, families and other social and charitable commitments that we do alongside our roles within the HSPTA.
