WORKING TOGET

Year 3 - This week Year 3 has been putting the WECARE skill Enquiring into good use. In History the children were archaeologists as they investigated what Stone Age man ate through examining some fake poo! Brown sourdough was packed with fish bones (dried spaghetti),fruit(raisins) and nuts(dried lentils). This was dissected by the children using some 'high tech' organic tools and the diet of Stone Age man was revealed. The children were then challenged to create a menu for a new Stone Age restaurant that was opening in Winchester.

In Science we were investigating which rock would be the best for building a monument. It had to be hard enough to withstand erosion and be water resistant.

In Maths we have started to learn formal written methods for addition and perfecting 2x tables. In English we have been writing stories based on our Stone Age Boy book looking to use a blend of action, description and dialogue

Year 5 Yet another busy but exciting week in year 5. In our reading lessons, the children have continued to show their fluency and reading aloud skills in our new book about a boy becoming a warrior for the Maasai Tribe. The children have explored and immersed themselves into African culture by learning lots of new vocabulary and words. In English, we are continuing with our Pandora planet and have been busy planning a chronological report for a new planet- describing its climate and atmosphere, landscape, plants and animals and any special features. In particular, the children really enjoyed creating new animals and plants for their planet. The children are very excited to start writing their reports next week. In maths, we are coming to the end of our statistics unit and this week we have been looking at line graphs and two way tables. We even had a chance to draw and plot line graphs, which the children did a great job at. In DT, we have been learning how to paper pattern clothes for our Mayan dolls, by using a tape measure we calculated the measurements and created paper templates for a poncho and skirt/kilt. Next week, we will be transferring these patterns onto material and cutting these out, ready to decorate.

Year 4 - What another busy week! The learning in year 4 land just keeps getting better and better. We thoroughly enjoyed finishing our parodies of Jack and the Beanstalk this week, tightening up our speech punctuation and even had the opportunity to read some of our masterpieces aloud. The range of ideas and the quirky imaginations of our year 4s never ceases to amaze us, with beanstalks substituted for giant sunflowers and pineapples and cows substituted for pigs, ducks and even turnips. "Jack! We have no money. Take our duck to the Chinese Restaurant!" was one example that particularly tickled the year 4 team.

Year 4 had a very exciting morning when some mysterious eggs appeared around the school grounds. We went on an egg hunt... we found some HUGE ones! What laid them? Where have they come from? The children had so many questions and are now all fired up to explore the rest of this unit in English. Watch this space! In geography, we learnt about local economies and how tourism is vital to the economies of areas such as the New Forest, and compared this to Yosemite in California. We discussed the positives and the drawbacks of tourism from the perspective of locals, employers and tourists, and considered how we might be able to make tourism more sustainable. In maths, we have been looking at formal written methods of addition and subtraction and understanding when we need to exchange between columns. This will roll into next week as we continue to refine our skills.

Year 6 - In this week of school we have enjoyed our lessons across the curriculum. In maths, we have been studying measurements (grams and millilitres) and converting them into kilograms and litres, learning how much extra we need to get to the next measurement up.

For instance 1I = 1000ml. In English this week, we have been studying a book called the 'Windrush Child' by Benjamin Zephaniah. We have been writing a letter to Theresa May about the windrush scandal in 2017. In science, we have been learning about electricity. We have put our knowledge to practise and have been building circuits making the lightbulb turn on and how many volts we add depends on how bright the bulb glows. Geography this week has been interesting as we have been deciding where the safest place would be in the school if there was a volcanic eruption. Our criteria was strong windows, walls and ceiling, supplies close by, most exits to hide from pyroclastic flows (lava flows) and ash clouds. LLL!!! Year 6 are also excited about the mosque trip next week on Monday where we will be learning about a religion (Muslim) and shall be exploring the life of Muslim prayer.
